Frankfort – Winford Frances “Fran” Crace Salyers, age 72, passed away on Monday, February 1, 2021. Graveside services will be held 11:00 a.m. at Frankfort Cemetery on Tuesday, February 23, 2021. Visitation will be held at Harrod Brothers Funeral Home from 6:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. on Monday, February 22, 2021.

Mrs. Salyers was born in Lexington on December 24, 1948, to the late Winford Whitt Crace and Mildred Frances Starnes Crace. She retired after serving 27 years as a teacher and after 7 years with the Kentucky Department of Education. Mrs. Salyers was currently serving as an advisor for Eastern Kentucky University. She served as the Executive Director of the Kentucky Middle School Association and the President of the Board of National Middle School Association.

She is survived by her son, Whit Salyers, Campbellsville; daughter-in-law, Kelley Richardson Salyers; brother, Bill (Akay) Crace, Lexington; sister-in-law, Linda Crace; and grandsons, Hunter Ingram, William Salyers, and Aidan Salyers. She was also blessed with several nieces and nephews.

In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by her husband, William Blackburn Salyers and brother, John Lee Crace.
