



## Dr. Steven H. Gale

August 18, 1940 - February 12, 2023

Frankfort, Kentucky – Dr. Steven H. Gale, 82, passed away on February 12, 2023. He was born on August 18, 1940, in San Diego, California, the oldest child of Dr. Norman Gale and Mary Wilder Haase.

Steve graduated from Duke University, UCLA, and the University of Southern California. He was a professor of English, specializing in modern drama and film, and was the founding president of the Harold Pinter Society and a leading expert on Pinter's work. Steve was a member of the 1964 cultural exchange team, Project India, and was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Liberia, West Africa, in 1973. He also taught at the University of Puerto Rico, the University of Florida, and Missouri Southern State College. He served as the Endowed Chair in the Humanities at Kentucky State University from 1988-2015. Steve authored sixteen books, including *Encyclopedia of American Humorists*, *Encyclopedia of British Humorists*, *West African Folktales*, books on humorist S. J. Perelman, and numerous studies of Harold Pinter's plays and screenplays. He also co-edited fourteen editions of the *Pinter Review*, and published hundreds of articles, essays, reviews, scholarly papers, study guides, and creative works. He served as a Danforth Associate and as president of the Frankfort Arts Foundation, was a member of the Frankfort Rotary Club, and was listed in *Who's Who in the World*. He loved being a family man, and enjoyed caring for his many pets, traveling the world, playing poker, and watching his racehorses run.

Steve is survived by his wife of almost 50 years, Kathy Johnson Gale, daughters Shannon Gale, Ashley Smith (Jason Smith), and Heather Gale (Joshu Goebeler), grandsons Edison Gale and Paxton Smith, sister Norma Wetzel, and nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents and his brother, Bill Gale.

To honor Steve, we ask that you plant a tree, take a walk in the woods, or donate to Hospice or the World Wildlife Fund.

Services will be held at Harrod Brothers Funeral Home on Monday, February 20, 2023, at 2:00 p.m. with Chaplain Adam Standiford officiating. A private burial will follow. Visitation will be held at Harrod Brothers Funeral Home from 12:00 p.m. until 2:00 p.m. on Monday. Arrangements are under the direction of Harrod Brothers Funeral Home & Crematory.

*After more than a year I came to know that Dr. Steven H. Gale has passed away on February 12, 2023. It was shocking because I still cherished to contact him. I was in touch with him through email but over the years the mail ID did not work and there was no response to my mails sent to his inbox. I had read his book “Butter's Going Up: A Critical Analysis of Harold Pinter's Work” in the eighties while working for my PhD Degree in Sambalpur University, India. I had the opportunity of meeting him in Lyon, France in 2007 in ‘Viva Pinter’, the International Symposium (22 – 24 March 2007). The symposium was held at University of Lyon (Jean Moulin). I felt privileged to interact with him and listen to his lecture. I was a guest speaker, the only participant from India. The affectionate appreciation I received from him after my presentation remains treasured in my heart. Unforgettable are the moments I shared with him, Professor William Baker and eminent theater scholars, filmmakers and lawyers. He was interviewed by Brigitte Gauthier on March 22, 2007. He was accompanied by his wife. We were staying in the same building in Lyon 3 campus. To be in the presence of great people is a matter of good luck. I feel lucky that our paths crossed though for a brief time. My deepest homage to the departed soul and heartfelt condolences to the family members.*

“ I am so sorry to hear about Dr. Gale. Enrolled the the Whitney M. Young Scholars program, I took several of his classes at KSU from 1990-1994. He taught many small town kids and his stories opened the world to us. He could tell a story about a place he'd visited and make you feel like you were right there! He seemed to love what was old, even vintage. Instead of new Toyota, he drove an old Jaguar. He valued quality, things that were well-made, I remember. He even lamented that Beta tapes weren't being made because the quality was superior to VHS. I've often wondered what he thought about Netflix and other streaming services!

I have remembered him fondly over the years and I regret I never reached out to thank him (again) before he passed. Despite my admiration for Dr. Gale's world travels, I haven't done near the amount of traveling I thought I would do. I've lived in Central Florida for over 10 years and I've never had a passport. But Dr. Gale showed me that books can take us around the world.

He taught his students to embrace cultural differences. I took a class with him once that only had 1 other student, a young man from Central or South America. Dr. Gale asked us what we each saw when we looked at the moon. We stared back, confused. I told him, of course, I always see the "man" in the moon. But my peer saw a "rabbit" in the moon. We were both surprised to learn that we saw the moon differently. It was a small thing, looking back on it, but for 2 young people at the time, it delighted us and broadened our horizons.

Dr. Gale taught "How to Read a Film" - my favorite class. Just the other day, I sat down to watch the *The Seventh Seal* (Ingmar Bergman) and I remembered his fascinating interpretation of the film. This wonderful, caring man was the professor who taught me that the purpose of criticism was to reveal the beauty in art. These days, I teach English Language Arts at River Springs Middle School in Orange City, FL. Thanks to Dr. Gale, I love exploring a text with my students and helping them understand "what makes it great."

More than anything I remember Steve for his kindness and gentleness and his tremendous love for his family.
